Where does Hosea fit in the Bible as a whole?

Where does Hosea fit in time?
➤ Hosea 1:1 helps us see that his ministry in Israel occurred between 2 Kings 14-20.
Hosea's ministry likely lasted upwards ofyears.
From 740-722 BC Assyria systematically overtook Israel making Hosea the prophet to minister to the Northern Kingdom.
In 586 BC, the Southern Kingdom was taken by Babylon, and the Israelites in Judah were in exile for 70 years. This is where we meet
Where does Hosea fit in God's overall plan?
Prophets were God's, and also known as seers.
What did he do and say?
Hosea married a in order to display to the nation of Israel their adulteress actions and attitude toward their Creator God.
Therefore there are layers to this prophetic book. Chapters 1-3 tell of Hosea's life, and the whole of the book, his ministry.

- 4. Imagine being in Hosea's sandals when God gave him his marching orders. How would you have responded? What would it take for you to obey an ask so great?
- 5. Pray for insight and discernment as we study the words of Hosea the prophet. Though these cries for repentance were for a specific people in a specific time, they may apply to us as well. Pray for ears to hear and a heart to respond.

- 4. What does it mean to you to know that the sting of death has been swallowed up in the victory of Christ?
- 5. Close this study in a prayer of awe and wonder. Look back over the contrast in your T-chart and thank Jesus for redeeming your rebellious heart by praying some of these specific words.
